## Our Amazing Heathlands: free talk on Monday 22 September.

Discover why heathland is so special, what dangers it faces, and how everyone can help look after it. Michael Jones, Education Officer of the Thames Basin Heaths Partnership, will give a talk hosted by WEVS on Monday 22 September at 7.30pm in the Sports Pavilion.

Michael writes "Hear about a world of nocturnal birds steeped in folklore, carnivorous plants and super-fast beetles with ferocious jaws. Delve into a habitat that provides a home for secretive reptiles, elusive butterflies that can disappear right in front of your eyes and many more fascinating species. Many of which can be found on our local heathlands. 'Meet' some incredible wildlife and hear about the work of the Thames Basin Heaths Partnership."

These ancient habitats not only offer biodiversity value but also hold cultural and historical significance, with some features dating back to the Bronze and Iron Ages including, at West End, four Bronze Age burial mounds and pottery, and proof of a metal-working Iron Age settlement living in roundhouses.



Drastically, 85% of Surrey's heathland has been lost over the past 200 years, so the remaining areas are now protected and managed for conservation.

## The Boxing Day Walk

Weather permitting, WEVS will be holding its traditional Boxing Day walk, an event which began in WEVS' early days of the 1970s and has continued almost unbroken ever since. Participants assemble in the car park of Tringham Hall on 26 December for a 10:30 start or opposite the Hare & Hounds at 10:40, suitably attired with warm clothing and sensible footwear.

The route will very much depend upon the amount of rainfall we have in the weeks before the event. Normally it covers a distance of around three miles. The first half of the route is relatively dry under foot and child buggy friendly. Mid-way there is an exit point where walkers can shorten the route and



return to the village by road. The route takes walkers across Brentmoor Heath and around the back of the village, ending up close to the Hare & Hounds pub about 1½ hours later, just in time to take some well-earned refreshment.

Mary & Chris Anthony have run this popular event for almost ten years and they are looking for volunteers to take over from them in 2026. It's a very simple task, a great way to catch up with old friends, to meet new ramblers and to make a much-appreciated contribution to the community.
